We're thrilled to be able to offer **Pay What You Can (PWYC)** for almost all of our ticketed events again this year.

We believe that Pay What You Can makes the Festival more financially accessible to more of our community, and will build love of the arts in the hearts of Whakatū and beyond.

When buying tickets to our main events this year, there are five price tiers to choose from: Tiers 1 and 2 are lower, Tier 3 is our recommended/ traditional ticket price, and Tiers 4 and 5 are higher, enabling those who can to 'pay it forward' to support others to access the lower-tier prices.

For our school bookings in this programme, we have simplified the tiers to three prices to choose from – please select the tier that is accessible to your kura and school whānau.

WAKA OF DREAMS: PUNANGA POHEWA LISSY & RUDI ROBINSON-COLE WORKSHOPS



Crochet extraordinaires Lissy and Rudi Robinson-Cole are among THE most exciting contemporary visual artists in Aotearoa right now with their ngā toi celebrating cultural heritage through captivating storytelling and artistic innovation.

We are immensely proud to host the debut of their new large-scale project, in collaboration with friend and multi-disciplinary artist Hollie Tawhiao: *Waka Of Dreams: Punanga Pohewa*, symbolising journey and aspiration, emerging at the Refinery.

This workshop will offer insights into their art practice as well as how whakapapa and tupuna inspire Lissy and Rudi's work – and how we can express identity and vision through crafts like crochet and carving, which are both traditional and contemporary.

PUKAPUKA TALKS MYTHS, MAGIC, FANTASY & TIME TRAVEL



Our 2024 Schools Programme features three stellar storytellers – Lauren Keenan, Rachael King, and Claire Mabey – who share their spellbinding tales (think 'writers are rock stars' vibe) and support tamariki to create their own.

In this special event for 10 to 14-year-olds, the authors will collectively discuss the inspiration for, and read from, their new books, before leading three parallel 45-minute writing workshops. (In advance, students will be asked to nominate, in which one of the three workshops they would like to participate.)

Lauren will lead a workshop where tamariki can learn how to develop characters to take them on their own time travel adventure. In Rachael's workshop tamariki will co-create their own mythical creature and then each student will write the first line of a story in which the creature would appear. Claire will lead a world-building workshop, where students will create their own planet and design the creatures, characters and objects that inhabit it. This workshop will stretch the imagination, and each pupil will leave with a dictionary of their new world.

REBECCA JENSEN DANCE WORKSHOP (DE)SYNCHING





RUTENE SPOONER THEATRE WORKSHOP TOKATU



An incredible opportunity to join Rutene Spooner for a theatre workshop! Designed for high school students (Year 9 and above) who want to learn skills in stage presence, explore their creative boundaries, and inject a touch of mischief into their performances, all while drawing on Māori cultural values and frameworks.

Titled *Toka Tū* - standing solo and making mischief; this workshop explores practical strategies for building character and holding the stage with confidence, combining a grounded stage presence with a sense of play and exploration. Participants will explore new vocal textures and inflections that enhance their character and performance. Learn how to create a cohesive performance that combines physical language, gestural language, and vocal techniques. Master techniques for controlling pitch, volume, and resonance to express their character's emotions and intentions.

ACTION EDUATION SPOKEN WORD WORKSHOP WITH SHELDON RUA + TALIA STANLEY



Looking to bring spoken word poetry into the classroom? Then come along to this workshop run by the amazing Sheldon Rua and Talia Stanely from Action Education Trust.

This workshop and performance is for all poets between the ages of 14 - 24 years. For all levels of experience. All participants will walk away with a draft of a poem, an understanding of spoken word performance techniques, and a chance to share their work. The workshop is designed for young people to freely express their worldview and identity through spoken word poetry in a safe and supportive space. After the workshop, participants are welcome to join the Victory Poetry Slam at Victory Boxing and either watch or perform a poem if they wish.

Did you know that in 2014, WORD - The Front Line, Aotearoa New Zealand's premiere youth spoken word poetry programme and competition was developed by Action Education? Since 2014, hundreds of young artists have taken part in the programme which has launched creative careers, fostered intercultural connection, and supported the resilient development of our incredible rangatahi.

Here in Whakatū, visitors will be greeted by Sam's friendly housemates at the Nelson Airport: the Parishioners have ventured from their home GLORIA in Māwhera Greymouth to form the most colourful festival welcoming committee we've ever seen. Meanwhile, a couple of his lads, Myths & Legends, will be chilling in the spotlight of the central city – go visit them at Lee Woodman Studio anytime during the festival.

MANU TUTETUTE | Charles + Janine Williams

Atelier Studio|Gallery

Renowned around the world for their visual storytelling in public spaces, urban artists Charles and Janine Williams explore the intricacies of identity vs cultural misconceptions in this exhibition of mixed media works. This is a celebration and must-see exhibition of contemporary ngā toi Māori by two internationally acclaimed visual artists from Tāmaki Makaurau.

SCULPT NATURE

Brook Waimārama Sanctuary

Immerse yourself in nature at the Sanctuary and witness six artists from around Aotearoa create sustainable, ephemeral artworks using only natural materials. Sculpt Nature was first launched in 2022 as a 9-day eco-sculpture symposium and competition hosted by the Brook Waimārama Sanctuary. The aim of the competition is to bring together the creative arts and conservation sectors through a symposium event that focuses on using natural materials.

The week-long eco-sculpture symposium offers a great opportunity to learn about conservation with artist talks and workshops while you get a fascinating look behind the (arts) scenes with the sculptors creating their bespoke works on site.
